
That's where we come in! Redwings is committed to saving these "throwaway" horses. But, we can't do it without you! . . .

As Redwings ushers in the New Year and the month of February, we wonder where last year got off to! With limited space, it's always hard to adequately summarize all the stories and events that happened at Redwings over the course of the year, so we'll just jump in and highlight a few we'd like to tell you about.

For those of you who check out our website and follow us on Facebook some of this may be familiar to you. Our goal in 2014, which is already in the works, is to update the website and provide more frequent postings to Facebook, so you can stay up with all the current events here at Redwings' Lockwood Ranch.

Last year, we welcomed three new rescues to our herd. The first to arrive was Pippen, a beautiful Shetland pony with failing eyesight who was featured in our fall newsletter; then Jazmine, who was rescued last summer; and in December we rescued Mack, or "Big" Mack as he's affectionately come to be known. Mack is a 22-year old Percheron gelding, who was in urgent need of medical attention from extreme malnutrition and neglect. Redwings continued its foster program and found wonderful foster homes for four of our favorite equine friends—Trigger, Elvis, and burros Olive and Hope. By all accounts, they've all settled into their new homes now, and they're in the care of doting foster families. The herd fared well throughout the year, but for the loss of Ridazza, who was the longest resident at Redwings, Buster, Latte, Lacey and Indy. As a final farewell, staff and volunteers

gathered at the ranch in Lockwood last August to commemorate these longtime friends.

As we ended the year, we began working hard to develop new ideas for increasing Redwings' media exposure to broaden our outreach and fundraising efforts. Look for the startup of a quarterly e-newsletter, for those who prefer to read about the goings-on at Redwings in the digital version.

Going into 2014, the Redwings herd now numbers 80 beautiful animals at the Lockwood Sanctuary whose lives are totally dependent on the kind and generous donations of people like you. Redwings pays a special tribute to long time patrons, Ed and Jan Mitchell, owners of Ranch Forgotten in Prunedale, California for their generosity and on-going support of Redwings' rescue and sanctuary endeavors. In January of this year, after considering the financial impact of maintaining two facilities, the Redwings' Board of Directors faced the difficult decision of having to consolidate operations and close Ranch Forgotten.

In 2000, Ed Mitchell and his late wife Jan, granted Redwings the free use of their 13-acre ranch. Redwings' plan was to have Ranch Forgotten, with its location close to the Monterey Peninsula, Salinas and the Bay Area, as a satellite location to promote community outreach and expand our equine education program. Throughout the years, Ranch Forgotten was staffed entirely by a group of dedicated volunteers whose personal contributions created a safe and secure place for the small herd who made their home there. Our thanks go out to each and every one of volunteers and we applaud their dedication to carrying out the Redwings mission.

On January 31, 2014 six horses were moved from Ranch Forgotten to the Lockwood facility to rejoin their herd. Redwings will be eternally grateful to Ed Mitchell and his wife Jan for their kindness and steadfast support of Redwings Horse Sanctuary.

Ed Mitchell will remain a member of the Advisory Board to Redwings' Board of Directors.
